2017-2018 ANNUAL REPORT OF NATIONAL PHILANTHROPY COMMITTEE

The Annual Meeting of the National Philanthropy Committee was held via conference call on Saturday January 20, 2018. Those in attendance were Julie Callis, Chairman; Linda Ashman, Secretary; Jeanie Claggett, Third Member; Bonnie Wells, National Secretary of Philanthropy; and Jeri Elliott, National President.

The purpose of the meeting was as follows:

- 1. Award Grants for 2018-2019 to graduate level students in the Field of Counseling.
- 2. Review new National Philanthropy Project submissions and make recommendations for awards.
- 3. Review and update forms, policies and procedures in the handbooks of the National Philanthropy Committee and the National Officers.
- 4. Discuss other national projects.

ANNUAL REPORT DELTA HOME PROGRAM DIRECTORATE JULY 2018

This report covers the business of the Delta Home Program Directorate since the 2017 National Convention at the Embassy Suites, Albuquerque, NM.

The Directorate has assisted a total of twenty-two (22) Delta Sisters throughout the past year. Each recipient is assigned to a Director who acts as a direct contact and cares for the recipient's individual needs. This is done by personally keeping in touch with them by letter or telephone and visits if they are near. We become a sister they feel comfortable contacting if a need arises.

Eighteen (18) recipients received regular monthly assistance from the Delta Home Fund. We are able to assist with the following types of expenses: rent/mortgage, various types of residential care, medical/dental expenses, prescriptions, insurance premiums, caregivers, taxes and monthly utilities. Four (4) Delta Sisters received gifts from the Special Gift Fund only, of those one (1) only receive the GRIT.

We are very fortunate to be able to shower our recipient Sisters with cards for most holidays, plus gifts and cards for their birthday and Christmas. We are only able to continue this extra kindness with your generous donations to the Special Gift Fund. These donations come as memorials, honors, thank you's and contributions from the heart. The Special Gift Fund was also used to pay chapter and alumnae dues for those able to maintain active and alumnae status. Individual copies of GRIT were provided to those who enjoy keeping abreast of all that is going on with Delta Theta Tau.

As of June 1,2018 we have nineteen (19) recipients. Fifteen (15) receive regular assistance and four (4) are remembered only from the Special Gift Fund. Membership status included eight (8) active members, three (3) alumnae and eight (8) MAL's. Thirteen (13) recipients live in their own home, apartment, condo or with their children; seven (7) live in health care facilities. They reside in Arizona, California, Florida, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Mississippi, Missouri, Nevada, Ohio and Oregon. Sadly, we lost three recipients this year.

Benefits paid to qualified members totaled \$108,588.00 for the 2017-2018 fiscal year. Special Gift Fund Expenditures for this year amounted to \$2,100.00. Since the inception of the program in 1972, \$3,081,092 in benefits has been paid. That's a big return on a two dollar a year investment.

The securities are held by Morgan Stanley, Indianapolis, Indiana. Investment monies are being managed by NWQ Investment Management Co., Los Angeles, California; Cadinha Conservative Asset Allocation, Honolulu, Hawaii and an Annuity with Nationwide Insurance. Reports on these accounts are received by the Directorate, National Council and Board of Trustees. A complete listing of income and disbursements for the Delta Home Program are a part of the audit and will be included in the 2018 National Convention minutes.

The Directorate held its annual meeting on July 16-18,2018 at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Knoxville, TN. Financial updates for each recipient were reviewed and the necessary business of the Directorate was completed.

Since 1972 the Delta Home Program has provided direct financial assistance for maintaining residence in a licensed home or living expenses in other situations to qualifying members. The qualifications are stated in the National Bylaws of Delta Theta Tau sorority, Article XXVIII, Section 4, and application has to be made. An application can be obtained from the Delta Home Program President. Applications are processed during the Director's Annual Meeting or throughout the year by correspondence and balloting.

This past year six (6) applications for assistance were requested. Three (3) applications were returned for consideration and assistance was granted to all three (3). We urge you to stay alert to the needs of your Delta Sisters and bring those in need to the attention of the Delta Home Directorate. They come from all areas of membership; active, associate, alumnae and MAL.

Delta Theta Tau should be very proud of this program because it demonstrates your love and commitment to the care of your Delta Sisters. We are so blessed to know that our organization not only helps our communities but also provides assistance for our own Delta Sisters. Thanks you.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

NATURE OF ACTIVITIES - The Delta Theta Tau Sorority, Inc. (Sorority) is a national women's organization dedicated to the advancement of philanthropy. The Sorority was founded on October 19, 1902, was incorporated on July 15, 1942, in the State of Indiana and was reorganized by the authority of the 1947 Convention. It has conducted its operations under the fraternal lodge system with 81 active chapters and 25 alumnae chapters during the year ending May 31, 2018.

The accompanying financial statements do not include the financial position and operating results of the various member chapters since such chapters have their own independent board of directors and maintain separate accounts.

- BASIS OF ACCOUNTING The accompanying financial statements have been prepared using the modified cash basis of accounting. Under this method such items as inventories, prepaid insurance, furniture and equipment, depreciation, convention coordinator advances, restricted funds, and escrow collections for philanthropic projects are accounted for on an accrual basis, while other items such as accounts receivable, interest receivable on investments, and accounts payable are reflected when received or paid. Investments are carried at fair value.
- BASIS OF PRESENTATION The net assets, revenue, expenses, gains, and losses are classified based upon the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. The Sorority has no temporarily or permanently restricted net assets at May 31, 2018 and 2017. Unrestricted funds are available for any purpose within the scope of the Sorority's activities. Designated funds may be appropriated by the Board of Trustees of the Sorority or by its bylaws or its policies for a specific activity or group of activities. Such designations could be changed by actions of the governing bodies as provided for in the National bylaws.
- CONTRIBUTIONS The Sorority accounts for gifts of long-lived assets as unrestricted support in the absence of specific donor-imposed restrictions to the contrary. In-kind contributions are valued at fair-market value as of the date of the contribution.

Support that is restricted by the donor is reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets if the restriction expires in the reporting period in which the support is recognized. All other donor-restricted support is reported as an increase in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets, depending on the nature of the restriction. When a restriction expires (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished), temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions. Contributions received with temporary restrictions that are met in the same period are reported as unrestricted support and increase unrestricted net assets.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

- CONTRIBUTED SERVICES A variety of people have contributed significant amounts of non-compensatory time to the activities of the Sorority. The financial statements do not reflect the value of these contributed services because, although substantial, no reliable basis exists for determining an appropriate amount.
- ESTIMATES The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the modified cash basis of accounting requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.
- INCOME TAX STATUS The Sorority is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(8) of the Internal Revenue Code. Accordingly, no provision is made for federal taxes on the Sorority's exempt activities. It is also exempt from Indiana income taxes. However, should the Sorority ever have income from certain activities not directly related to its tax-exempt purpose, that income would be subject to taxation as unrelated business income. The Sorority's policy is to include interest related to its tax positions as interest expense or interest income and penalties as operating expense.

Management evaluates all significant tax positions as required by the modified cash basis of accounting. As of May 31, 2018, the Sorority believes that it has appropriate support for any tax positions taken, and as such, does not have any uncertain tax positions that materially impact the financial statements or related disclosures.

The Sorority's information returns are subject to examination, generally for three years after the filing date.

- CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS For the purpose of the statement of cash flows modified cash basis, the Sorority considers all highly-liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents. The money market funds within the brokerage accounts are considered to be cash equivalents.
- INVESTMENTS The Sorority carries the majority of its investments at market value. Accordingly, unrealized gains and losses are recorded for the increase or decrease in the market value of assets from the beginning of the period to the end of the period.
- INVENTORIES The Sorority maintains a small amount of used jewelry, which is available for resale to the sorority chapters. These items are stated at historical costs.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

PROPERTY AND DEPRECIATION - Property and equipment owned by the Sorority are carried at cost or, in the case of donated property, at fair-market value determined at the date of gift less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is recorded on the straight-line method over estimated useful lives of the assets.

Expenditures for maintenance and repairs and certain small elements of renewals are charged to expense as incurred, while additions and betterments are capitalized. The cost and accumulated depreciation of property sold or otherwise disposed of are removed from the accounts, and any gain or loss thereon is credited or charged to income. Depreciation expense totaled \$217 and \$216 for the years ended May 31, 2018 and 2017, respectively.

EXPENSE ALLOCATION - Expenses are charged to program services or support services based on a combination of specific identification, allocation by national officers, and as allowed by specific programs. The Sorority does not have any fundraising costs.

NOTE 2 - NATIONAL FUNDS

The Sorority maintained seven National funds as of May 31, 2018, as follows:

<u>General Fund</u> - This fund is maintained to defray the operating expenses of the Sorority as approved by the National Council and Board of Trustees. The General Fund receives the major portion of its revenue from national, alumnae, and membership-at-large dues allocations.

<u>GRIT Fund</u> - This fund is maintained to defray the cost of the official publication of the Sorority. Its primary source of revenue is from subscription income.

<u>Philanthropy Fund</u> - This fund is designated to finance the approved national philanthropic projects of the Sorority. The fund receives the major portion of its revenues from national, alumnae, and membership-at-large dues allocations.

<u>Delta Home Fund</u> - This fund is maintained to provide care for eligible and qualified members who are in need of financial assistance for residency in a licensed home or private facility. Investments of all funds by Delta Home is subject to approval of the National Council and the Board of Trustees. The fund is administered by the Delta Home Program Directorate.

In accordance with the bylaws of the Sorority, the Delta Home Fund is segregated into two different accounts and consists of the following:

NOTE 2 - NATIONAL FUNDS (continued)

<u>Principal Account</u> - This account includes all monies that were held in reserve as of June 1, 1972, and any additional funds made available through bequests. These funds are to be used for the perpetuation of the Delta Home Program and are shown as unrestricted - designated on the statement of assets, liabilities, and net assets - modified cash basis. See the Board Designated Endowment note for more discussion.

Operating Account - This account includes all monies from annual dues, contributions in lieu of dues, and the combined net investment earnings of this account and the Principal Account. These funds are to be used to provide care for eligible and qualified members who are in need of financial assistance for residency in a license home or private facility.

Norma Money Benefit Fund - This fund was created to assist members who are in dire need. The fund receives a 2% allocation of national and alumnae dues each year.

<u>Founders Memorial Expansion and Growth Fund</u> - This fund is used for the perpetuation and growth of the Sorority. The fund receives a 5% allocation of national sorority dues paid by members of alumnae associations and 2% of national dues paid by active, associate, and student members.

<u>Bequest Fund</u> - In accordance with the bylaws of the Sorority, the Bequest Fund is segregated into two different accounts and consists of the following:

<u>Principal Account</u> - This account includes all monies that were held in reserve as of February 17, 2007, and any additional funds made available through bequests. These funds are to be used for the perpetuation of Delta Theta Tau Sorority, Inc. and are shown as unrestricted - designated on the statement of assets, liabilities, and net assets - modified cash basis. See the Board Designated Endowment note for more discussion.

Operating Account - This account includes all combined net investment earnings of this account and the Principal Account. These funds are to be used to perpetuate Delta Theta Tau Sorority, Inc.

Up to 4% of these funds may be withdrawn on November 15th of each year and dispersed with 75% allocated to the Philanthropy Fund and 25% allocated to the General Fund.

In addition to the National Funds, several funds are maintained for the activity associated with the annual national convention and province conventions. These funds are established under the Sorority's tax identification number; however, these funds are not under the financial control of the Sorority and have not been included in the financial statements.

Notes to the Financial Statements

NOTE 3 - CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK

Financial instruments that potentially subject the Sorority to concentrations of credit risk consist principally of cash, equity, and other investments. The Sorority generally places its investments with financial institutions and attempts to limit its credit exposure to any one financial institution. Cash deposits at each financial institution are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation up to \$250,000. From time to time, cash balances may exceed federally insured limits. As of May 31, 2018 and 2017, the Sorority did not have any balances in excess of the FDIC limit. On May 31, 2018 and 2017, the Sorority had \$2,146,935 and \$2,131,860 invested in its brokerage accounts, respectively. The Sorority maintains a continually managed investment strategy to diversify the risk of these investments; however, they are subject to normal market risk. Investments held in brokerage accounts are not FDIC insured. The Sorority does not require any collateral to support its financial instruments.

NOTE 4 - RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Sorority invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, credit, and market risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in values of investment securities will occur in the near-term and such changes could materially affect amounts reported.

NOTE 8 - FAIR VALUES OF FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

FASB Accounting Standards Codification 820, Fair Value Measurements defines fair value as the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (an exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. This standard also establishes a fair value hierarchy which requires an entity to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs when measuring fair value. The standard describes three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair value:

Level 1 - Quotes prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

Level 2 - Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities; quotes prices in markets that are not active; or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities.

Since that amount resulted from an internal designation and is not donor-restricted, it is classified and reported as unrestricted net assets.

Annual dues, or contributions in lieu of dues, and the net interest and dividend income shall be used to provide care for eligible and qualified members who are in need of financial assistance for residency in a licensed home or private facility.

<u>Bequest Fund</u> - All monies held in reserve as of February 17, 2007, shall be secured by an investment program. On November 15th of each year, 4% of the assets as of October 31st will be transferred into Sorority accounts.
